# Year 3, Mrs Roberts





What a term! The year 3 team are so proud of all our children. The children moved up to Hook Junior School in September and have made a very positive and successful transition. Other adults in school have commented how polite, friendly and keen the children are. Every morning the children are very excited to come to school, eager to learn and find out what the day entails. This term the children have studied The Magic and Mystery of Trees and Malala's Magic Pencil in guided reading, which they have all thoroughly enjoyed. They have written some detailed and imaginative setting descriptions about the Secret Garden, clear and organised instructions for planting cress seeds, written a narrative about an exciting trip inside a washing machine and even researched and published a biography all about Malala. During maths, the children have revised and developed their place value knowledge, learnt multiple mental strategies for addition and subtraction and have begun to work on the formal written method of column addition. Science has taken a plant focus all term learning about germination to pollination. They have even designed and created greenhouses to help germinate their own cress seeds. In history and geography, the children have studied their local areas of Hook and Basing House and undertaken a trip into the village to collect data about how it has development over time. These are just a few subjects the children have experienced this term but there has been many more! It was lovely to see so many parents and carers for the Year 3 learning events in November in which the children got to share this learning with you. On behalf of the year 3 team, I would like to thank you for your help and support in aiding a smooth transition from infant school and hope that you are able to enjoy a lovely Christmas and we look forward to seeing you in the New Year.

# Year 4, Miss Bowyer






Year 4 have had a very exciting Autumn term focusing on explorers and volcanoes. The children thoroughly enjoyed learning about Shackleton and his expedition to Antarctica, using this as inspiration for some fantastic diary entries and biographies in English. Our non-fiction work continued with a non-chronological report about volcanoes. Children used key features such as subheadings and facts to inform their audience about the fascinating structures.

DT work was linked to the diets of explorers, with the children planning, making, tasting and evaluating vegetable curries. They practised key cooking skills and worked well in groups to produce some delicious looking and smelling curries. We definitely have some chefs in the making!

Shackleton was also the inspiration for our art work. Using mixed mediums, the children created zig zag booklets to demonstrate an explorer's journey.

The highlight of the Autumn term for us all was our Christmas performance of 'What Christmas Means To Me'. As I'm sure you will agree, the children were amazing in all of their performances. Everybody had a role to play and developed their acting skills as well as their stage presence throughout the rehearsal and performance process. The children should be very proud of themselves as we know that performing can be a daunting prospect for many. The year four teachers are all extremely proud of the hard work and determination demonstrated. Well done Year 4!



# Year 5, Mr Colebrooke

Year 5 have had a cosmic start to the year as we have ventured through space on a journey of discovery while learning about our Solar System. We explored why Earth experiences night and day and different seasons, used Oreos to represent the eight phases of the moon and created PowerPoint presentations to share our understanding of the neighbouring planets. Our Discovery topic culminated in a fantastic astronomy evening where - despite the cloudy weather - we were able to discover more about the night sky and experience what it is like to look though a powerful telescope.



The wonders of space inspired much of our learning this autumn, including within English where we were enthralled by the fascinating life of Katherine Johnson, the African-American mathematician whose work for NASA was crucial to the space program. We concluded the writing for this term by creating our own suspense stories about the short film Planet Unknown, which featured some brilliant language choices to create atmosphere.

Our art for the term was out of this world! We explored a range of new techniques such as masking and relief, combined with idea's gained from Peter Thorpe's rocket abstracts, to create a diverse mixed-media constellation of space-themed pictures.

Place value into the hundreds of thousands, negative numbers, efficient mental strategies for addition and subtraction and statistics have all been areas of maths that we have developed a deeper understanding in the autumn term. We even had one memorable day where we learnt about line graphs in maths, used a line graph to plot the emotions of a character in English and then finished the day by presenting our findings from a science experiment on a line graph!

The tired, cracked ground was scattered with Jagged, strip rooks, sharp in every corner. However, when two rushed rovers came racing post they flew up in a hurry. These rovers were here for a reason, they had been tasked with finding life on the last unsearched planet.

As soon as the rovers had reached the planet, an intense heat was dropped over them. Given the heat, they stopped to admire the beautiful sight of two means darking moons borning over the dark planet. Way above the lighest planet was a brilliantly blue sky littered with clouds, some wispy some durgy. Far away they I could sense a joint smellor of burning ground; erupting into chames. Although the sights were wonderous, it seemed almost impossible to achieve their goal...

For the final two weeks of term there has barely been a day where the central area hasn't been filled with the pleasant aroma of freshly baked bread. The children learnt how to make bread dough and the technique of kneading while exploring new flavours for the topping of their delicious focaccia.



One of the highlights for the term was being able to welcome parents and carers in to school and share much of our fantastic learning at our space assembly. It was wonderful to see how proud the children were to share their discoveries and achievements as well as the confidence with which they delivered their lines and sung the songs (I think I have only just managed to get '93 million miles' out of my head).

This is just a taste of what we have been doing in Year 5 this term. Well done to the children from all of the Year 5 teachers for a fantastic first term and a thank you to parents and carers for your continued support. We can't wait to share some of the fantastic things we have planned for the spring!

# Year 6, Mrs Heaslop

#### We'll Meet Again

Since the first day of the term back in September, the Year 6s have thoroughly enjoyed the topic learning all about World War II. They have been immersed in the historical context not only though the history learning but also through our main text driver: Good Night Mr Tom.

This rich text has provided the stimulus for much of the writing the children have produced this term – from an air raid advice leaflet and writing a letter as an evacuee, to a lost chapter of the book and an emotive persuasive speech. They have all demonstrated they are able to write from different perspectives and they have been engaging to read.

Over the term the children have been able to apply their creativity in a number of ways. After studying the work on Henry Moore, a WWII artist, the children replicated some on his techniques to create their own piece as well as a class sculpture instillation inspired by his work of Londoners sheltering from the Blitz in the underground. Our music lessons this term have focused around

singing well-known WWII songs which they had the opportunity to share at the Learning Event. After this, they composed their own compositions to 'Pack Up Your Troubles' with a range of percussion instruments. Finally, if you're not sure what to do with any Christmas leftovers, then look no further: the children have been perfecting the best recipes for bubble and squeak using ingredients which would have been available during the war and, we have been assured, that they will be more than happy to assist you in peeling, cutting, mashing, seasoning, cooking and serving (remember to go easy on the garlic salt).

The children have also been fortunate enough to hear two first-hand accounts from members of the Hook community. Sue who resided in Southampton and Giulio, who lived in Italy shared their experiences as children during the war. The Year 6s were surprised to learn how Giulio's home became occupied by Nazis and how barrage balloons were used in Southampton to protect the docks from German planes. Looking at the vast collection of historical European memorabilia they bought with them was certainly a privilege too.

#### **Attendance**

At the end of the Autumn Term 2022, we have 124 children who have achieved 100% attendance. As a school, we aim for 97% attendance which is an ambitious target especially considering the number of viruses and bugs that we have seen in recent weeks. This term, we have 268 children who have managed 97% attendance or better. Good attendance is important because statistics show that pupils with good attendance have higher attainment in school and studies show that children with attendance above 97% make better progress both socially and academically.

Persistent Absence is defined by the Government as attendance below 90%.

National and school data clearly shows that poor attendance leads to poor educational outcomes. Pupils who are persistently absent have lower levels of attainment at the end of KS2 than other pupils. National data shows that of those who were persistently absent, 40.2% achieved the expected standard in reading, writing and maths at the end of Key Stage 2 compared to 83.9% of pupils with no missed sessions and 71.9% who missed between 0 and 5% of school. This is a significant difference and a trend we have seen in our own data.

Over the past few days, we have been contacting some of the families of children whose attendance is below 96% to inform them of their child's attendance. For children below 90%, we have invited parents / carers into school for a discussion about how we can work with them to support their child's attendance. We acknowledge that every child's circumstance is very different and we aim to work with parents/carers to understand their personal situation. We believe that working together with parents is the best way to result in positive attendance outcomes for our children. Please come and talk to our attendance lead, Miss Carne, if you have any concerns about your child's attendance or punctuality.

# Thank you to everyone who has volunteered

We would like to express our thanks to everyone who has volunteered their time to help the school this year.

Parent readers who regularly visit have provided lots of opportunity for children to improve their reading. We are grateful to those of you who come to school regularly (and in some cases several times each week!) to read with children. We hope that you will be able to continue to do so in the new year. If you would like to help children with their reading and can spend 15 to 20 minutes with a pupil at the start of school, or just before the end of the school day, please let us know by emailing the school office.

This year we have asked volunteers to help us with some projects in our grounds. A small number of parents have given their time to help construct 'welly walls' that will allow pupils to store a pair of wellington boots at school, enabling them to make use of areas that might otherwise be underused in the winter months, such as the school field. Members of Hook In Bloom, a local

horticultural group, recently visited and assembled a number of raised beds that children in which children will soon be growing their own produce. We continue to seek multiple volunteers to help us assemble a poly tunnel that children will use to grow produce and sensory plants. If you would like to volunteer, please contact me via the school office. If your employer encourages you to volunteer for one or more days each year, a few hours spent at school will provide tremendous benefit to the pupils.

Throughout the year, many of you have made generous offers in many forms. Whether this has been with a personal financial donation, providing some support or donation to the HSCA, offering some of your time to volunteer, supporting a trip, coming to a learning event or watching a production – we are very grateful for your contribution and hope that you will continue to support us in the new year.


